Engaging with the Media

Scottish Interfaith Week is an important opportunity to unite Scotland's diverse communities and show the positive changes we can make together.

We live in challenging times and often the media will try to divide us, whether because of our religions, cultural backgrounds, ethnicities or other differences.

It doesn't have to be like this. You can be part of changing the narrative.

If you are hosting an event for Scottish Interfaith Week, get your local media involved.



Finding media contacts

You can find local newspapers, radio and tv stations near you by searching online.

Most media outlets will have a contact form on their website or a general email address you can contact.

Informing the media

There are two key ways you can inform the media about your event.

You can send a *media invite* which acts as a 'save the date' - an invitation for members of the media to attend your event and cover the story. The invite includes details about place, date, time and what to expect.

You can send a *media release*, also known as a press release, which is an announcement to the media about your event. It is formatted as a finished news story and can be sent before your event or immediately after. If you are sending it after, make sure to change the text to past tense.

You can copy your invite or release into the body of an email before sending it to your media contacts.

The media will look for a hook in your invitation or release, something timely and relevant.

You may think the media only focus on negative news, but local media **love** a good news story. Tell them why the event matters and who it will bring together.

Media invite: ask them to attend

Good morning

Media release: inform them about event

Scottish Interfaith Week brings together communities in [your area]

Scottish Interfaith Week is an annual festival celebrating the nation's religious and cultural diversity.

Everyone is invited to the festival, taking place 8th-15th November 2026 in towns across Scotland. The programme is bursting with colourful events hosted by local faith communities, interfaith groups, charities, universities and schools.

This year's theme of wellbeing is an opportunity for communities to show how Scotland's diversity is a source of resilience in challenging times. Events will explore wellbeing in its many forms: spiritual, physical, mental and social.
